ON A JOURNEY...

Going on a journey can be both exciting and exhilarating. At the same time it can be risky too. This is because of the uncertainty about what one is going to come across during that journey. The metaphor of being on a journey is one that is used by many people in a range of situations. The Bible too is full of examples of people on a journey and each one has a number of messages for the reader to better understand the implications of setting off on a journey.

As catechists we walk alongside others on their spiritual journey. It helps to bear in mind however, that we are not going to be journeying with those in our class or group forever. The chances are that we are with them to support them in their faith journey for a short period of time - in most cases a matter of a few months or terms. This means that one of the thinks we ought to work towards is to give them the tools needed to carry on the journey of faith for when we are not there and they have to continue on their journey without the support or promptings of a catechist or a teacher. Such skills or tools include:

A SENSE OF COMMUNITY

Instilling an understanding of the importance of **community** and being an active part or member of a Christian community wherever you are.


A LIFE OF PRAYER


