

Colour in the drawings below and read about a few important events in the life of St George Preca. (Some of this information can help you complete the crossword overleaf).




St George was born in Valletta, Malta on the 12th February 1880. He was baptised in the church of St Dominic. His parents were Vincent and Nathalie.



While studying to become a priest, George was in danger of loosing his life due to a lung disease. His parents and doctor were very worried but he recovered and was ordained priest at the age of 26.



Soon after becoming a priest, St George continued to meet with the young people he had met in his parish. This was the beginning of SDC, the Society he started for people who wanted to become catechists and to teach others.



At the age of 82, George fell seriously ill. He was still conscious and insisted on reading the Gospel even on his deathbed. He died on Thursday 26th July, 1962.
